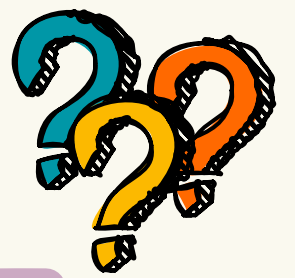




THE MOST CONFUSING SPANISH



Intensifiers in Spanish

Bien

bien = well, fine, quite

Bien is an Adverb

Adverbs can describe:

adverbs, adjectives, or other verbs.

Hablas español muy bien

You speak Spanish very well.

Los chicos estan muy bien, gracias.

The boys are fine, thank you.

Bailas muy bien.

You dance very well.

Yo canto bien.

I sing well..

La sopa esta bien buena.

The soup is quite good.

Bien is invariable, but the adjective that follows will match the noun being described.

Adverbs usually go in the end position. They sometimes go in front position, especially if we want to emphasise the adverb.

VS

Bueno

bueno = good

Bueno is an Adjective

Adjectives describe:

nouns

Tu español es muy bueno.

Your Spanish is very good.

Los chicos son muy buenos.

The boys are very good.

Eres muy buena bailadora

You are a very good dancer.

Soy buena cantante

I'm a good singer.

La sopa de pollo es buena para la alma.

Chicken soup is good for the soul.

Spanish adjectives agree with nouns in gender and number, and usually go after the noun.

Some adjectives are placed before the noun. Before a masculine singular noun they have a shortened form, removing the "o":

buen/buena mal/mala algún/alguna,
ningún/ninguna primer/primera, un/una
